Haiti – A Philatelic Miscellany by Roger Marshall

Haiti is the western third of the island Hispaniola or St Domingue. Ironically, Haiti in the 18th century was French and had been the jewel of the Caribbean and the single richest colony in the world. During the French jurisdiction, there were approximately 36,000 French aristocrats ruling over 28,000 mulattos and some half a million slaves.

The local inhabitants worked on the extensive sugar plantations that supplied Western Europe with sugar and coffee.

The first great slave revolt in Haiti in 1791, inspired by the French Revolution, led to the resounding victories won against the armies of Spain, Great Britain and France by the Haitian general and hero, Toussaint Louverture (1743 – 1803).

Given his outstanding success and standing, it is no surprise his image was used on several stamp issues as a support for many of Haiti's ineffectual but rapacious presidents.

Through his victories, Louverture prepared the way for his principal Lieutenant Jean-Jacques Dessalines to become the first Emperor of Haiti.

On 1 January 1804, Dessalines officially named the first negro republic Haiti, an Arawak Indian name.

The republic was soon totally impoverished by years of battles, land misuse, damage to irrigation systems and deforestation



Under Dessalines rule, Haiti became the first country in the Americas to abolish slavery.

Unfortunately, Dessalines became an autocrat and in 1806 he was assassinated by his administration then dismembered by a violent mob. From 1843 until US Marines landed in 1915, Haiti suffered almost constant tyranny and disorder.

The economy struggled during the depression and American invasion, but root problems of corrupt official were never dealt with.

The US occupation was primarily motivated by a combination of political instability and economic interests. The US was concerned about the potential for foreign (particularly German) influence in Haiti which they viewed as a strategic location in the Caribbean.

Roger Marshall is a member of APS, serves on its committee, and is a well know collector of French philately. He is also passionate bibliophile so can often be found at book fairs.

The rule of the Duvalier's began in 1957. Papa Doc, after 13 years of intimidation, violence and black magic dies and was succeeded by his rapacious daughter-in-law and son for another 15 years.

To try and attract the biggest possible number of visitors we created what we hoped would be Auckland's biggest stamp and hobbies exhibition for some time. Our primary aim was to expose philately to anyone looking for a hobby by giving them a chance to explore, discover and engage. We think we achieved that objective.

With around 1,500 unique visitors attending over the two day event, there was a constant flow of people through the two large halls used for the event.

As well as the 2025 Interclub and Auckland Stamp Exhibitions, visitiors had the opportunity to review and assess stands from the Auckland Wargamers (who held a tournament on Day 1), the NZ Genealogy Society, astrology, ham radio, bonsai tree growers, plastic models, die cast toys, hotwheels, Taekwondo, the Papatoetoe Historical Society, pinball machines, papercrafts, books, the Auckland Numismatic Society, postcards, coin and banknote dealers, war medals, as well as stamp dealers and sellers, the Auckland and South Auckland Philatelic Societies and outside the halls three food trucks offered a variety of options.

Onsite accommodation and catering was also offered and utilised by a number of out of town visitors who made the most of the two day event.

The cost of the site, administration, catering and a support advertising and promotional campaign that saw approximately \$14,000 invested in brochures, posters, radio, the NZ Herald website and Facebook advertising was covered by the Auckland Philatelic Society out of its reserves with generous support also being received from the Zeapex Trust and the South Auckland Philatelic Society. We thank both for their unconditional support.

A number of visitors joined local Societies as a result of the event and we know even more left with a greater understanding of what philately offers as a hobby.



The Keith Griffith Memorial Lecture was this year given by Denise Rosenfeldt, President of the South Auckland Philatelic Society who presented her Gold Medal winning Fast Post exhibit to the Sunday APS

Fast Post was to become the new Post Office's attempt to stimulate and reimage the old postal structure. Introduced on 7 June 1988 Fast Post lasted just 12 years before on 7 June 2000, it was quietly retired.

Using a fleet of vans, trucks and aircraft, New Zealand Post guaranteed mail would be delivered next day to and from major towns and cities. Mail categories were abolished and pricing was based on size rather than weight. The importance of the change was that it was radical, revolutionary, a world first and lay the foundation for postal changes that happened from this point.

Denise's exhibit has an amazing array of material – from promotional material, Fast Post labels issued for the service, labels in use, business materials, postal stationery, mail centre markings, details of vehicles and aircraft used, reasons for mail delays, and a chronologically detailed history of 12-years of Fast Post activity.

As a researcher, archivist and postal historian, in her Fast Post exhibit, Denise clearly demonstrates her finely honed talents and skills and very little if anything is missing from this 8-frame collection of a part of unique

postal history. Her presentation skills held the interest of a very knowledgeable group of attendees and the intrigue the subject generated ensured a nonstop flow of questions at the conclusion of the presentation.

As might be expected, the Fast Post rates were a substantial jump on those previously paid for Standard Post and with Fast Post being the priority focus for the new Post organisation, Standard mail took a little longer than might have been a sender's previous experience.

Denise explained that with careful review, collectors can quickly differentiate between label printings and presentation/pack formats, Different colour variations, bandings and layouts all contribute to a fascinating study of a unique part of New Zealand Posts history.

Under the previous "Inland Airmail" system, the service performance of one to three days was achieved 81% of the time in 1988. The revolutionary changes achieved next day delivery 96% of the time for Fast Post.

The improvements in service standards across the whole of New Zealand Post's business was rewarded with the 1994



"Company of the Year" Award in the Deloitte/Management Magazine top 200 awards.

Their advice ranging from feasibility studies to total re-engineering of postal systems was sought internationally to emulate one of the most efficient and inexpensive postal service in the world. How times have changed.

NEW ZEALAND PHILATELIC FEDERATION AWARD OF MERIT



During the award presentations at the recent Auckland Philatelic Society's Hobbies Expo a very special and long overdue acknowledgement was made to Denise Rosenfeldt by NZPF Secretary Jeff Long.

The Federation presented Denise with its *Award of Merit* for her service, commitment and her contributions in all aspects of philately in New Zealand, with particular emphasis on her administrative leadership in the hobby going back to 1994.

Denise has been and still is an exhibitor most recently winning Gold at Royalpex for her NZ Post Fast Post Service Exhibit (see above).

She's a researcher and a regular contributor to Postcard Pillar.

She's been involved at all three levels of administration in NZ Philately being the President of the South Auckland Philatelic Society where she has been a member for over 31 years, Secretary of the Association of Northern Philatelic Societies and previously a delegate to the NZ Philatelic Federation.

She is a well-known judge and has also been the NZPF

Commissioner to several regional and national exhibitions.

She's been involved in Youth philately and as many APS members know is willing and readily available help to people looking to develop their exhibiting skills.

Denise has been an almost annual presenter at the Auckland Philatelic Society and we regard her as one of our own – so well-done Denise! Long overdue recognition for a very special member of our philatelic family.

A RARE PIECE TO ENVY

At a recent meeting Roger Marshall, our collector of all philatelic things French, shared with the gathered members a rather special "replica" sheet.

We thought you might enjoy us sharing it with you.

It is from the Strasbourg Philatelic Exhibition held between 4 and 12 June in 1927.

It's a replica sheet with the 5f blue and the 10f red stamps featuring the Semeuse (Sower) first issued in 1906.

The sheetlet measures 111 x 140mm and if you are lucky enough to have an unhinged, mint copy in your collection you should look after it – according to Scott, it's catalogued at over US\$2,300.



NIUE - A POSTAL HISTORY SNAPSHOT

One of our favourite philatelists, Brian Carroll shared part of his Niue collection with members at our mid-September evening meeting.

Around 900 AD Niue became a Polynesian Settlement. The first known European contact occurred on the 21st of June 1774 when the British ship Resolution arrived at Niue and spent a day sailing down part of the coast. Captain James Cook and some of his men made two brief landings during which they engaged in limited but fractious encounters with the Niuean inhabitants. As a result, Cook named Niue the "Savage Islands" and promptly sailed away.

Sixty-four years later Missionary John Williams became the second European to visit Niue and after some effort successfully ingratiated himself to the local natives.

In 1900, Niue became a British Protectorate and in 1901 (with a population of 4,576) it was annexed by New Zealand.

In 1974 Niue became a Self-Governing state in Free Association with NZ, by this time its population had fallen to 3,992. In 2022 Niue's population was recorded as 1,689.



The Distance from Niue to New Zealand is 2,824 kilometers. The air travel distance is equal to 1,755 miles.

No Wharf - No Worries

A Brief Niue Postal History Journey

- 1846 1901 Missionary Mail
- 1901- NZ Surface Mail direct/indirect (via other islands)No
- 1970 First Air Mail Small runway Pago/Fiji/Tonga
- 1981- Full Air Mail Runway Extended direct to NZ

Brian gave the assembled great overview of how simple beginnings lead from one stepping stone to another. His Niue collecting interests began with his interest in the NZ 1900 1/2d Mt Cook, then the 1d Dominion, the 1901 1d Universal, all of which led to his interest in Pacific Island Overprints, the 1901-1968 Niue/NZ stamps, Niue Cancellers and finally Niue Postal History.

The Niue Stamp History

Brian outlined the production history of Niuean stamps which began in 1901 via the NZ Government Post Office and Government Printing Office, was taken over by the Niue Philatelic and Numismatic Company in 1966 and returned to New Zealand Post in 2009.

The Niue Post Office opened in 1902, and mail was cancelled by the Postmaster by hand as the below envelope dated 6/1/1902 with manuscript illustrates.



W. H. GROVE & SONS was established in 1896 as Island Merchants and Exporters to the Pacific of Dairy Products and all New Zealand consumer and manufactured goods. They are still in business today.

As might be expected, during these early days of the Niue Postal system, a large number of different cancellers were used, and this "cancellation" segment of philately can provide collectors with many hours of discovery.

Brian's presentation demonstrated exactly how wide and interesting this area of study can be.


